IN 1818 Lord Charles Somerset instructed J.H. Fisher, magistrate of Tulbagh, to find a suitable area for the establishment of a new magisterial seat. The area of present day Worcester impressed him so that he consequently recommended this area to Somerset. The loan farms Roodewal (also Roode Draai) and Langerug were obtained from Du Toit and Barend Burgers in 1818. Worcester was laid out according to a definite plan with parallel streets. The first erven were auctioned on the 29th February 1820. These erven were within the borders of Somerset, Durban, Riebeeck and Tulbagh Streets and were sold for between 200 and 400 riksdaalders (R30 to R70). The official date for the foundation of Worcester is 1820. The main street, High Street, ends against the Drostdy, the most important building in the town

at the time. The square in front of the Drostdy provides the Drostdy with the necessary approach which full appreciation of this impressive building demands. Town planning shows a neo-classical influence and the architecture followed suit. The construction of private buildings sometimes occurred in the absence of an architect. The people of Worcester developed their own building styles, amongst them the Worcester gable.

In 1850 the importation of corrugated iron began and many houses were provided with verandas, many of which were removed during subsequent restorations. Many houses have Cape Dutch, as well as Victorian characteristics. A large number of gabled houses have been retained in Worcester, because, unlike Stellenbosch and Paarl, Worcester never suffered big fires.



1 The Drostdy, Somerset Street



Built, according to plans signed by Cape government architect, William Jones, in the neo-classical style. Construction started in 1823 and Charles Trappes was the first landdrost. There is a beautiful courtyard laid out with pebbles.

2 DISTILLERY ROAD: The Old Gaol (Jail)



Originally built as an outhouse of the loan farm Langerug, used as jail since 1826. Situated in a hollow, it was very damp and thus unhealthy and also not very secure. After improvements have been made in 1839, it was regarded as "a healthy place of confinement". In more recent times the jail was converted into offices and at present is used as a residence.

3 170 CHURCH STREET - The Barn



The building has a front gable with a flat top and wavy outline. The block, on which this building and the houses on 166 and 168 Church Street, was originally known as Glennan Estate. The Barn is now used as an art gallery and coffee shop.

4 Wykeham



These two houses used to be a unit, originally built by Wykeham, 1835, but divided into two units circa 1935, with the loss of a beautiful centre gable.

5 162 Church Street, "At Last"



The first, temporary, Dutch Reformed Church in Worcester, 1821. Subsequently church for the Rhenish Mission Congregation, a smithy and in 1922, an old age home, "At Last".

Later additions turned it into a very good example of Victorian architecture. Ventilation openings give an indication of the height of the original thatched roof.

6 Sunday School Hall



First parish in the Cape province to have a Sunday School Hall, designed

specially for that purpose. Inaugurated 1916, seating 800 and 40 'cubicles' or class rooms. When the lid of the small classic organ opens it reveals little carved devils with stuck out tongues.

7 Dutch Reformed Mother Church - 1832



The original church, in Gothic revival style with straight gables and a short towered spire was inaugurated in 1832. After several enlargements it was rebuilt in 1897 and fitted with a tin spire which was blown off twice. The present tower dates from 1927. The original pulpit built by Wouter de Vos, it still in use.

Beck House -1841





Beck, a law agent, after whom the house was named lived in the house until 1919. The Becks also built the smaller house in Church Street, next to Beck House for their unmarried daughters who provided the towns people with a lively cultural life. One of the Beck children, Meiring, became a doctor and a prominent political figure, Sir Meiring Beck.

9 Avonrust, 70 Church Street



This Victorian house has a front with a pediment gable and a decorative round vent. The gable is decorated with a barge board and the triangular bay is heavily rusticated. The verandah has a little gable decorated with woodcarving and finial. Next door is a coach house where the original coach house door has been replaced with a window to facilitate

10 68 Church Street



The plot was allocated in 1822 to the first and only assistant magistrate of Worcester, J.F. van de Graaff. The house, built in 1860, has a very nice example of the arch-decoration on its gable,

so characteristic to Worcester and the district. It has a Worcester type gable with a bow over the tympanum. The original end gables were removed but the chimney is intact.

11 66 Church Street - Heritage Site



This double storey building has a flat roof with a simple parapet. It is Georgian with Victorian characteristics, e.g. the woodwork. The outer corners of the building have quoining and rustication. There is a small balcony above the front door. The building was used as

Naude's Boarding House, a business of J.A. du Preez and as a hostel for the boy's High School. Dating from 1860, it was restored and somewhat altered in 1991.

12 54 Church Street



This Victorian house has a triangular gable decorated with a wooden barge board and an arched vent with plaster hood moulding. It has a bay window and a verandah on each side. There are plaster mouldings on the façade between the veranda and the roof.

13 52 Church Street - Tuishuis, Heritage site



Tuishuis (Farmer's town house), a three-bayed, thatched house between straight end gables; it has a four pilaster front gable with an unusual three lobed pediment. The front door is a stable door. The Hugo family of Toontjiesrivier used it as a house in town, as was

common practice for farmers, when they came to visit town. Circa 1850.

14 42 Church Street - The Pines



This plot was bought in 1820, on condition that the owner would build a proper house for an old freed female slave, Leentjie Topper, who was living in a mud hovel on the plot. Leentjie's house was across the street. The high Victorian house was built in 1897. For

a long time it was run by nuns as a maternity home. If you look at the building from Fairbairn Street you will notice a cross on the roof and chapel windows which date from the time of the nuns.

15 28 Church Street - Heritage Site 1830



This 5-bay, Cape Dutch thatched saddle-roof house with straight end gables and a Worcester-type gable with a bow over the tympanum. The arched dormer window (slightly Gothic) makes this unique. The verandah is

paved with Brandwacht slate. The house has a Karoo-type addition with a string course. The front door has a semi-circular daisy-leaf fanlight. The year 1830.

16 Church Square - Heritage Site



The Square served as an outspan for churchgoers from 1819. It was also used as show grounds, sports grounds, promenade concerts grazing for cattle and a parade ground for the

"Volunteer Rifles". An important feature of Church Square is the Garden of Remembrance.



Across the square, on the corner of High and Adderley Street, is a beautiful Art Deco building, built in 1936.

On the corner of High and Adderley Street, is a small building, the former Sunday School building of the Rhenish Missionary Church, in which a religious revival occurred in 1860 during the time of the Rev Andrew Murray, a world famous theologian who at the time was the minister at the Dutch Reformed Church on the opposite side of the square.

17 Church Square buildings



25 Baring Street, known as Die Hoefsmidhuis (farrier's home), was built around 1835 by the local farrier, P U Fischer. It was later occupied by law-agent PA Malan, a well-known political figure who, amongst other

things, named the Afrikaans daily paper, De Burger, was involved with the Union Constitution and in whose home the National Party was founded.

18 Hugo Naude House & Jean Welz Gallery





The building was designed and built in 1903 by Hugo Naude, the first South African to study in art overseas. The style is mainly neo-Classic, with a pedimented front gable. In 1990, the building was changed to incorporate a modern addition to form the Jean Welz Art Gallery. Naude was

very involved in the Worcester cultural life and often used the studio for cultural meetings. He also fought for the preservation of old buildings. After his death in 1943, the building became an art school with Jean Welz as principal. Paintings by Naude, Welz and Paul du Toit are exhibited there.

19 Kleinplasie Homestead



Kleinplasie, on the outskirts of town, on the Worcester Museum grounds, is the remnant of the original farm, Roodewal (or Roodedraaij) that was granted to Pieter du Toit in 1746. In 1819 it was

expropriated from his descendants for the founding of Worcester. With walls 600cm thick, three gables and a beautiful facade, woodwork in yellow- and stinkwood and some of the original panes in the windows, Kleinplasie over the years opened her doors to illustrios travellers like word-famous botanist Henry Lichtenstein and Sir Alfred Beit. During the Anglo Boer War the grounds served as remount camp to British soldiers and officers lived in the homestead.

NOTABLE FANLIGHTS (windows above doors) and DOORS in Church Street:

No. 164 - Above front door, front stoep windows and above bay window on corner.

No. 140 - Above front door and note design repeated above windows. Note garden wall and solid garden gates, possibly the originals.

No. 130 - Exceptionally high fanlight: round, filling the whole square above the door.

No. 36 - sun's rays with scalloped design on the outer edge.

No. 28 - Daisy-patterned fanlight . Also note the name Roodewal which has a connection with the original farm name, although the reason for the house bearing this particular name is obscure. The original Roodewal Homestead has been renamed Kleinplasie (small farm) after sales had diminished the land.

No. 24 - Above front door.

No. 51 - Note entrance to present-day Pub, Barrels, with the tile decorated pillar's built into the entrance walls.

No. 156 - not the original broekie lace

No. 129 - An exquisite example of Victorian buildings, with a little built out porch attached to the front stoep.

No. 70 - note the original broekie lace






Brandwacht Mountains - Hugo Naude


